The team has said that they will wait and see, but sources say they are both shopping Mitchell and quietly trying to add another corner to replace him. Also on the injury front, the 'boys have all but scrapped their future plans for Drew Henson and assumed that he will not play again. He had been close to a long-term contract but the team, in a bit of luck, had yet to present it to his agent. He's saying all the right things about being in a decided game late, but is not so sure about the future. Now there is even talk of bringing Carson Palmer to town. If they don't get Palmer, look for a large focus on the run next year with their stable of backs ... TAMPA rookie corner Phil Becker has taken to the right side of the field despite never having played there. Coaches credit vets like Ronde Barber and Dexter Mc-Cleon with his development. On the other side of the ball, they will give Leo Coppa one more shot next year, allowing him to play with their franchise wideout Michael Clayton. Still to be determined is the fate of record-setting running back Jarrett Payton... Nothing official yet, but the champions may have to dismantle. The **PATRIOTS** stand to be about \$25 million over the salary cap and may have to start dumping players. They assembled the team to win it all and it's a near certainty that there will be several untouchables on the roster, but to cut the payroll they're going to need to part
